

Give our little potato a face. Maybe legs and arms? Or does he look more like an alien, with 8 eyes and tentacles? Use your imagination!




Now that your drawing of our potato is all finished, describe him in words to a friend or someone in your family. Without showing them your drawing. Let them draw a potato based on your description.

ABOVE AND BELOW


Look! There are all sorts of things above and below the ground. Use the picture below to talk about what you see using words like above, in, under, and sheltered. Do you know their opposites?

happen next? Is your ending open, or closed? How do open endings make you feel?

We know what happened to the potato, and how he was feeling. Now write the story from the perspective of the person who found him. Make sure that the same things happen as in the original story of our potato. To help you, start with a list of the different events in the story.
